In 1922, Mr. Harry Muchnic acquired the residence for his family. Today, The Muchnic Foundation is the proud owner and caretaker of the house, generously making it accessible to the community. Since 1970, the house has served as a dedicated exhibition space for the Atchison Art Association. Throughout the year, it showcases art classes, special events, and rotating exhibits featuring some of the most talented artists from our region. In recognition of its historical significance, the house was added to the National Historic Registry in 1974.

Over the course of several years, Mr. Howell diligently gathered wood for his home's interior, resulting in the creation of intricate patterns that adorn the entire house. In total, there are 47 patterns meticulously crafted using walnut, mahogany, and two distinct types of oak. The home boasts an array of original stained glass windows, each showcasing exquisite craftsmanship. Additionally, the lower level features intricately designed fireplaces that have stood the test of time.



Constructed by lumber merchant George W. Howell in 1885, the Muchnic Gallery was initially intended as a family residence. The arduous construction process took a total of 7 years, with its completion finally achieved in 1892.
